

RELEVANCE OF INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT) IN EDUCATION

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Abstract

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) has become an essential component of modern education systems as it has transformed the educational sector by improving teaching methods, enhancing student engagement and expanding access to knowledge. The integration of ICT in education has transformed traditional teaching methods, improved access to information and enhanced students' engagement in learning activities. Thus, the paper recommended increased investment in ICT infrastructure, continuous professional training for teachers and the integration of ICT into educational policies to improve learning outcomes.

(2020) demonstrate that

such engagement is closely linked to improved academic outcomes, as students who are actively involved in their learning are more likely to internalize and apply knowledge effectively.

The effectiveness of ICT depends largely on how it is integrated into the pedagogical framework. When technology is used without a clear instructional purpose, it risks becoming a distraction rather than a tool for learning. The digital divide, which refers to the disparity between those who have access to technology and those who do not, remains a significant challenge. In many contexts, students from disadvantaged backgrounds are unable to fully benefit from ICT-based education due to lack of devices, poor internet connectivity or limited digital literacy. This raises important questions about the extent to which ICT can truly democratize education without addressing underlying socio-economic inequalities.

ICT and the Changing Role of the Teacher

The integration of ICT into education has profound implications for the role of the teacher. In traditional settings, the teacher is often seen as the primary source of knowledge, responsible for delivering content and evaluating students' understanding. ICT challenges this model by shifting the focus from content delivery to facilitation of learning. However, this transition is not without challenges. Many educators lack the necessary training and support to integrate ICT into their teaching practices. As noted by Tondeur et al. (2017), teacher beliefs, attitudes and competencies play a crucial role in determining the success of ICT integration. Without adequate professional development, the potential benefits of ICT may remain unrealized.

Theoretical Framework

This work is anchored on the Constructivist Learning Theory and the Technology Acceptance Model (TAM).

- i. **Constructivist Learning Theory:** Constructivist learning theory emphasizes that learners actively construct knowledge through interaction with their environment. ICT supports constructivist learning by providing interactive platforms where students can explore information, engage in problem-solving activities, and collaborate with others. According to Piaget (1972) and Vygotsky (1978), learning occurs through active participation and social interaction. ICT tools such as discussion forums, collaborative platforms and simulation software create opportunities for such interactive learning experiences.
- ii. **Technology Acceptance Model (TAM):** The Technology Acceptance Model developed by Davis (1989) explains how users adopt and use new technologies. According to this model, two main factors influence technology adoption:
 - a) Perceived usefulness
 - b) Perceived ease of use

In educational settings, teachers and students are more likely to adopt ICT tools if they perceive them as useful and easy to use.

Relevance of ICT in Education

The relevance of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in education can be seen in the following ways:

- a. **Enhancing Teaching and Learning Processes:** ICT plays a crucial role in improving the teaching-learning process. It enables teachers to present complex concepts through multimedia tools such as videos, animations and interactive simulations. These tools enhance students' understanding and retention of information. Research indicates that ICT integration improves comprehension and simplifies the teaching process by making learning materials more engaging and accessible (Lubaale, 2022). ICT also supports different learning styles by providing diverse learning resources, including digital textbooks, online lectures and educational applications.
- b. **Improving Students' Engagement and Motivation:** The use of ICT in classrooms increases student participation and motivation. Interactive technologies such as smart boards, educational software and virtual learning platforms make lessons more engaging and enjoyable. When students interact with digital tools, they tend to develop greater interest in their studies and participate more actively in learning activities. Studies have shown that ICT-based learning environments improve student engagement and academic performance by providing interactive and flexible learning opportunities (Idowu, 2025).
- c. **Expanding Access to Education:** One of the most significant contributions of ICT in education is the expansion of access to learning opportunities. ICT enables distance learning and online education, allowing students to access educational materials anytime and anywhere. This flexibility is particularly beneficial for learners in remote areas or those who cannot attend traditional classes. ICT platforms such as virtual classrooms and online learning management systems facilitate the delivery of education beyond physical boundaries, thereby promoting inclusive education and lifelong learning (Nwosu & Ogbomo, 2021; Young, 2019).
- d. **Supporting Collaborative Learning:** ICT promotes collaboration among students and teachers through digital communication platforms such as email, online discussion forums and collaborative tools. These technologies enable learners to share ideas, work on group

projects and engage in interactive discussions regardless of geographical location. Collaborative learning facilitated by ICT enhances critical thinking, problem-solving skills and teamwork among students.

- e. **Improving Teachers' Professional Development:** ICT also contributes to teachers' professional development by providing access to online training programmes, educational resources and professional learning communities. Teachers can enhance their instructional skills through webinars, online courses and digital teaching materials. Research indicates that ICT-assisted training significantly improves teachers' pedagogical knowledge and teaching effectiveness (Tadesse, et al., 2022).
- f. **Enhancing Educational Management and Administration:** Educational institutions also use ICT for administrative and management purposes. Digital technologies facilitate efficient record keeping, communication and management of academic information. Student information systems, digital attendance registers and online grading platforms simplify administrative tasks and improve institutional efficiency.
